In Lent, we are invited to take time to pray, to fast (whether that may mean giving up food, or maybe being disciplined about how we consume different things), and to give charitably. Our worship takes on a more reflective tone. Why do we do these things? In Lent, there is also something of a formation, or *re-formation*, of us – that we may be molded and re-shaped, that our hearts may turn from previous ways.

We acknowledge how our lives are often curbed-in-on-self – seeking our personal wants and needs, and neglecting the needs of others and the common good. We are called to turn outwards, to see those we haven't seen before, to open ourselves in new ways.

As we consider our future at our Annual General Meeting, this month, can we also open ourselves prayerfully to see where we might go to meet the new person, to make new connections, to open ourselves in ways we've not done before?

I love the words of the hymnist – acknowledging pain and brokenness in life, but also an openness to be reshaped. The season of Lent begins on Ash Wednesday and ends with the celebration of Easter Sunday. It is a season that is generally marked with a more reflective and penitential tone. We often think of it as a time of preparation, growing spiritually as we get closer to the mystery of Jesus' death on a cross, his resurrection on Easter Sunday, and the life that we have because of that.

In the early Church, Lent was often a time of more intense and dedicated learning and devotional practice as people prepared for baptism and entrance into the Christian community. We still very much tie our understanding of baptism into the Lenten and Easter seasons.

The season of Lent is 40 days long (we don't count the Sundays during Lent), which is representative of Jesus' 40 days fasting in the wilderness before beginning his public ministry.

Historically, Lent is a time of self-reflection and repentance, prayer and fasting, and sacrificial giving. You may have heard the phrase "giving up something for Lent." Often, people observing Lent will fast from something – give something up – as a spiritual discipline.

It could be a certain type of food (like meat), or a behaviour that someone might consider a vice (like smoking or caffeine). Others will add something, like reading daily devotions or spiritual reflections or praying more regularly. (http://sherpark.ca/season-of-lent/)

First Week of Lent (Feb 26)
