In my work with MNO Synod (2015-2019), I had opportunity to travel on a few occasions. Certainly, I visited congregations around the synod, but I also had the opportunity to go to Split Lake in Northern Manitoba in 2016, and Cameroon in 2019.

It has been life-changing for me to have opportunity to interact with other cultures – be it with Anglicans in Tetaskweyak Cree Nation, in the northern part of our province, or an African expression of our Lutheran denomination in west Africa. In these, and other, experiences of faith and life in other places, I have come to realizations about my own journey. While I may have hopes and dreams, and I wish things for my children, I realize that others who live differently than me also have such hopes in life. And, sometimes because of reasons that are out of one's control, the opportunities I have are different than those in Split Lake or Cameroon. From my position, I can live in a way that holds up their story.

Even more, I often ask myself, how does my living impact someone somewhere else? I make decisions about transportation differently; even the fruits and vegetables I buy, and the clothing I wear.

The Transfiguration story is a "realization" - these weeks following the Epiphany are all about the realization of Jesus' divinity, God incarnate in our midst! And people live differently after encountering Jesus.

How do we *live out* the "one body" with our neighbours in far-away places, making room for their expression of our shared faith?

Who was "Simeon" in Christian scriptures?

On February 2 each year some churches hold a service of the Presentation of the Lord. The Gospel basis for it is Luke 2:22-40. The story falls into three parts: the framing story (vv.22-24, 39-40), into which are inserted the response of Simeon (vv.25-35) and the response of Anna (vv.36-38). The framing story itself has one governing focus: Jesus grew up in a family that meticulously observed the law of Moses. No fewer than five times in this text Luke



tells the reader that they did everything required in the law. Later in life Jesus would be in tension with some interpretations of his tradition, but his position would not be that of an outsider. On the contrary, Jesus' own nurture in his tradition prepared him to oppose flawed and hollow practices in the name of the law of Moses. [...]

Within the story of Jesus' presentation in the temple are two testimonies to who this child really is. The first is offered by Simeon, a devout old man filled with the Holy Spirit and assured by the Holy Spirit that he would not die until he saw God's Christ (vv.25-26). The Holy Spirit leads him to the temple at the very hour when Jesus is being presented. The scene is a moving one: an old man now ready to die holding a six-week-old baby who is, at long last, "the consolation of Israel" (v.25). The consolation of Israel refers to the messianic age of which Simeon sings in phrases that draw heavily on Isaiah 40-55. This song, the *Nunc Dimittis* (so called after the first two words in the Latin translation of "Now, Lord, you let your servant go in peace"), is inspired speech, and therefore in it the Holy Spirit is declaring Jesus to be the means of salvation for all people, Jew and Gentile (vv.30-32).
