"Ordinary Time" - Time of the Church

The period between Pentecost and Advent is called Ordinary Time. This season makes up almost half of the church year. The word "ordinary" used in this context does not mean unremarkable, but rather comes from the word "ordinal" meaning "counted." During Ordinary Time, we move from Sunday to Sunday, with each one standing on its own. The Sundays in Ordinary Time are the called the Sundays *after* Pentecost.

The season of Ordinary Time celebrates the ongoing work of Jesus in and through his people.

The liturgical color for Ordinary Time is green. Green is meant to symbolize hope, to be a symbol of life and growth. As the plants sprout and bring forth new growth during the warmth of summer, so we too, use this time to grow in our faith and discipleship in our ordinary daily life as we follow the teachings of Jesus.

The bookends of Ordinary Time are Trinity Sunday, the first Sunday after Pentecost, and Christ the King Sunday, the last Sunday after Pentecost and the week before the beginning of Advent. (http://blcfairport.org/ordinary-time-what-and-why/)

MESSAGE FROM OUR COUNCIL CHAIRPERSON

As I write this there is continuing news about the Covid-19 pandemic and its effects on absolutely everybody. Our province of Manitoba thankfully has not been severely afflicted with a heavy rate of casualties and even makes reports of no new victims day after day. A Phase 2 reopening plan is to take effect on June 1, 2020 allowing limited access to restaurants and other businesses, as well as permitting indoor gatherings of no more than 25 people practicing social distance, and outdoor gatherings of no more than 50 people. There is even provision for an outdoor event of unlimited size provided the participants stay in their cars.

Needless to say, our Gloria Dei members miss our weekly in person worship services and patiently await their resumption. They wonder how much longer we must carry out ministry remotely and online. When can we all meet again in person?

Our MNO Synod has released guidelines for the reopening of our church buildings and resuming worship services. What this involves, in brief, is measures such as deep cleaning of the facility, no access to hymnals or bulletins, no singing or responses said aloud, maintenance of physical distance between worshippers, very restrictive Eucharistic practices, and so on.

Pastor Erik Parker of Sherwood Park Lutheran Church here in Winnipeg has written a very eye-opening article, "So Your Church Is Opening Up After COVID-19 Closures? It Won't Be What You Are Hoping For." Pastor Erik presents a surreal "Twilight Zone-like" view of what a resumption of worship services at this time would be like.
