<u>Easter – Ascension – Pentecost – Holy Trinity</u> *What's the connection...??*

The Ascension of the Lord is celebrated 40 days after Easter Sunday on the Thursday in the sixth week of Easter. Based on the Acts of the Apostles, the Church holds that Jesus ascended into heaven 40 days after His resurrection on Easter Sunday.

The Ascension and Pentecost are not the same, though they are connected. It was 10 days after Jesus' Ascension into Heaven that the Holy Spirit was able to descend upon His disciples.

Pentecost signals the end of the Easter season and is also the day we recognize as the birth of the Church.

Did you know...?

That big candle next to the font is called a "Paschal Candle" or "Christ Candle." It symbolizes the resurrected presence of Christ. Typically, we light it on three occasions in our church life together: for baptisms, at Easter (and through the Sundays of Easter), and for funerals.

What about that Sunday after Pentecost...?

Trinity Sunday (the Sunday after Pentecost Sunday) celebrates the Christian doctrine of the Trinity, the

three Persons of God: Creator, Incarnate Word, and the Holy Spirit. Since it was after the first great Pentecost that the doctrine of the Trinity was proclaimed to the world, the feast becomingly follows that of Pentecost. (https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Trinity_Sunday) We see importance, at Gloria Dei, to use expansive language for God, and to move away

from words that limit God – after all, we believe the Source of Life is beyond gender!

The Celtic *Triquetra* first appeared in insular art around the 7th century, famously in the Book of Kells, but also carved into Celtic Crosses and holy buildings and monuments.

Also known as the *Celtic Trinity Knot*, the Triquetra has a strong connection to the Holy Trinity in Christianity.

International Day Against Homophobia, Transphobia, and Biphobia (May 17)

Deeply-embedded homophobic and transphobic attitudes and social norms leave many lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer and intersex (LGBTQI+) people extremely vulnerable to discrimination. Far too often, LGBTQI+ people are singled out for hate-motivated violence, or even murdered. Many are mistreated and even disowned by their own families. This has led to LGBTQI+ people, of all ages and around the world, being among those left furthest behind as countries pursue the Global Goals.

There has been notable progress. From 1990 to 2023, the number of countries criminalizing private, consensual same-sex relationships decreased from 113 to 64. In many countries, social norms are also becoming more accepting. Nevertheless, there are chasms to cross. In those countries where discriminatory laws persist, individuals are exposed to the risk of arrest, prosecution and imprisonment. Regrettably, a small number of countries have even begun to consider extending existing criminalization, even to the point of considering bans on relevant work by human rights defenders and introducing the death penalty for so-called "aggravated homosexuality". There can never be a justification for such egregious violations of human rights.

The International Day Against Homophobia, Biphobia and Transphobia (IDAHOBIT) is observed annually on 17 May to raise awareness about the discrimination and violence faced by LGBTQI+ communities
